

## ACTS 17:16-34/ February 17 Welcome! Thank you for joining us in studying through Acts! Tonight

we will spend more time studying in Acts 17. Let's recap! We learned from Acts 16 that Paul and his companions have been to Philippi, where they were

imprisoned but then set free by a

"Gospel earthquake" that God used

to save the Philippian jailer and his household. From there, in the first 15 verses in chapter 17, Paul, Silas, and Timothy go to Thessalonica and Berea where they have to escape both places quickly because of opposition. Let's begin by reading Acts 17:16-21. Who is on this journey and where did they go? (Reference verses 14-15.) Who are the people in this story? What is happening? - How does Paul feel about what

he sees throughout Athens? - Why do you think Paul was so upset about the idolatry he saw in Athens? - What is his response? Paul sees the overwhelming idolatry and can not help but respond by

sharing the Gospel with Jews and

Gentiles in Athens. The Epicurean

(think modern day YOLO — "you

only live once") and Stoic (think "what will be, will be) philosophers wanted to know more and took Paul to the Areopagus (religious and civil center) to address the group. In verses 22 and 23, Paul begins by
